Issaquah Salmon Hatchery fetes 75th anniversary on Earth Day

The iconic Issaquah Salmon Hatchery opened along Issaquah Creek 75 years ago and, in the decades since, developed into a symbol for the community and a lifeline for fish species.

The anniversary celebration, which begins at noon Sunday — Earth Day — will be hosted by the nonprofit Friends of the Issaquah Salmon Hatchery.

"The hatchery brought back the salmon to Issaquah," FISH Executive Director Jane Kuechle said.

Participants can tour the hatchery, at 125 W. Sunset Way, learn about the history from 1937 to the present, feed trout, dissect a salmon, hike to a dam along Issaquah Creek and release salmon fry into the creek.

West Seattle park safety takes center stage

Residential customers completed a range of weatherization projects — including added insulation, efficient heat pumps and energy-efficient windows.
