Christian French and Equinox Special Projects Division / Estuary

Friday June 5, 7-10 pm **Duwamish Revealed Grand Opening Celebration!** The Estuary

An evening of industrial soundscapes and sculpture featuring Christian French and Equinox's massive shipping container sculpture Estuary, sound installations & performance by Klaas Hübner and Lysandre Coutu-Sauvé, and contemporary cellist Lori Goldston. First Thursday preview on June 4, 6-9 pm.

Saturday July 11, 8 pm **The Barroom Writers Offensive Gateway Park North**

Hosted by Doug Nufer and featuring Cristien Storm, Mortimur K, Eric Greenwalt and Dave Johnston. A lively reading of site-specific material about the Duwamish.

Sunday July 12, 7 pm Doug Nufer & Wally Shoup Gateway Park South

Doug Nufer presents a poetic tribute to the river by dredging and capping the executive summary of the Proposed Plan: Lower Duwamish Superfund Site, with musical interludes by Wally Shoup on sax.

Friday July 17 & Saturday July 18, 8 pm Queen Shmooquan: A River Runs Through Her (Jeppa K Hall & Joe Plotts) The Estuary

A hilarious, psychedelic musical "happening" featuring Queen Shmooquan, the everyday American hero within whom lies a Modern Day Oracle. Followed by Jesse Card's portable outdoor cinema, featuring two documentaries about the Duwamish Tribe: *Princess Angeline*, dir. Sandra Osawa, 2008, 53 minutes (Friday); Chief Seattle, dir. BJ Bullert, 2000, 80 minutes (Saturday), with talks by the filmmakers on both nights.

AUGUST 2015

Tuesday August 4, 7:30 & 9 pm A Canoe Journey Through Time (Michael Lewis & Jordan Monez) **Duwamish Waterway Park**

A part of National Night Out, experience a multisensory nighttime canoe journey through the past 20,000 years on the Duwamish: the geologic transition from glaciers to volcanoes and earthquakes; the influx of habitation and life; the growth of culture, language, and community; an engineered transition to industry and commerce; and an unknown future of continued change and adaptation.

Friday August 7, 7 pm
Reverberando—Reflection of your waters (Milvia Pacheco, David Blanco, & Mirta Wymerszberg) **Jack Block Park**

Reverberando performance of theatre, dance, live music, and singing, in the Spanish language. Using Latin American traditional music and original text, Reverberando draws connections to the Spanish-speaking cultures along the river. The performance lasts about 20 minutes and repeats, with variations, at several different locations in the park. Reverberando will also be performed at the Water Festival on August 16 at Duwamish Waterway Park.

The City Meditation Crew is a group of 'city workers' who call attention to sites and actions simply by paying attention. In this CMC action, the workers will guide and paddle boats silently on the Duwamish River itself. CMC invites audiences to witness, or experience first hand, the paddling meditation from a contemplative point of view. Bring your own boat, or wait at the Herring House Park T-107 boat launch (near the 'Rotary Club of West Seattle' bench) for pick

Duwamish Waterway Park




