UPCYCLING



While home, the class will prepare for the trip and study Ecology 101.




ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The course will be a mixture of reading the books and viewing of the films within the C.S. Lewis' Narnia series.




TAP DANCE

Cost: TBD




HISTORY VS. HOLLYWOOD: DECADES

Requirements: Laptop, Photoshop.




ROBOTS & HUMANITY
