



If You See Something, Say Something!

The Seattle Police Department has identified a trend of individuals transporting wounded and injured subjects, that appear to have been present or involved in violent crimes, to various hospitals. This trend avoids police contact which can in turn prevent immediate life-saving care, preservation of evidence, and witness information.

As a reminder, if you are involved in or a witness to a crime, especially violent crimes, please call 911 and allow Officers to respond to the scene- this ensures that Officers are able to collect valuable evidence that may help solve the case!

Other tips for calling 911-

- Know your location (exact address is best)
- Call if you can, text if you can't
- Allow the call-taker to guide the conversation
- Answer all questions, be as explicit and as descriptive as you can
- Stay on the line until the call-taker tells you that you can hang up
- Remember- it is always okay to be wrong! When in doubt, call 911!
- Inform the call-taker if you would like contact from responding Officers, and how you would like this contact (i.e. in person, over the phone, etc.)
- Notify the call-taker if you have photos, or video evidence of the crime
